Bio:

Dr. Jason Warner is an Assistant Professor at the U.S. Military Academy (West Point) where he also serves as the director of Africa research in the Combating Terrorism Center (CTC). He is also a Term Member at the Council on Foreign Relations, and serves as an Adjunct Professor at American University's School of Public Affairs. He also serves as the Co-Editor-in-Chief of the undergraduate journal The West Point Journal of Politics and Security. He is a specialist in African terrorism and security affairs, and African international relations and foreign policy. His current research focuses on the emergence and spread of the Islamic State and Al-Qaeda on the African continent; the tactics of violence that these groups use; and how non-African international states engage the continent, especially in security affairs. Dr. Warner holds a Ph.D. in African Studies from Harvard, an M.A. in Government from Harvard, an M.A. in African Studies from Yale, as well as a B.A. in International Studies from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.
