Advanced Strategist Program

The Advanced Strategist Program (ASP) is a specialized track for students skilled in the practice of formulating, developing, and executing strategy at various leadership levels in order to fill key billets in Navy, Joint, and high-level political staffs.

Eligibility

 U.S. Navy resident students are selected and assigned to ASP prior to arrival at U.S. Naval War College (NWC). Sister services may apply for the remaining academic slots for this program.

Location & Duration

 The 13-month program is completed in conjunction with the College of Naval Warfare curriculum. Students are taught at NWC in Newport, Rhode Island.

Learning Format

 Core Courses are primarily seminar format but include lectures, a master's thesis, and strategic planning exercises during the summer.

Outcome

 Students in this program are awarded additional credit on top of the master's degree in National Security and Strategic Studies and JPME II credit. U.S. Naval officers will earn Naval Strategist Subspecialty Code (2300p), U.S. Air Force officers will earn Advanced Study Group credit, and U.S. Army officers will earn the 6z Army Strategist skill identifier.

General Program Overview

Professional Paper, Master's Thesis | Ongoing, Required

Work on an academic master's degree-level thesis guided by a principle academic advisor, along with a military faculty member and the ASP director.

Advanced Strategist Program Course | All Trimesters, Required

Students will be enrolled in a course pertaining to advanced strategy; including national security, economic considerations, and the limitations of seapower.

Perspectives on Modern War | All Trimesters, Required

Students take lessons from their core curriculum and apply them to emerging challenges in the international security environment. Major themes vary by trimester and are connected to the annual symposium within the trimester.

Joint Military Operations | Fall Trimester, Required

Engages students in the study of the theater-strategic and operational levels of war across the spectrum of conflict.

National Security and Decision Making | Winter Trimester, Required

Focuses on strategic-level issues, including the effective selection and leadership of military forces.

Strategy and Policy | Spring Trimester, Required

Emphasizes grand strategy, students will examine case studies to consider the long-term effectiveness of all instruments of national power.

Leadership in the Profession of Arms | Summer Practicum, Required

This course allows students to recognize their impact on those they lead and enhance their thinking and ethical decision-making for their future leadership roles.

Summer Capstone | Summer Practicum, Required

The summer program offers students the opportunity to apply their academic and practitioner knowledge.
